Approximately 50 people gathered at the end of the newly formed road at Tanguisson Beach Park for the historic ground breaking of the Northern Treatment Outfall and the Hagåtña Treatment Outfall Projects. The outfall projects will go out over a 1000 meters out to the ocean. This will help us dispose of sewage and treated water safer and more efficiently. GWA broke ground on the Hagåtña outfall extension project at the same time. The purpose of both of these projects is to extend the ocean discharge outfalls for the Hagåtña and Northern District WWTPs in order to improve the quality of Guam's oceans and beaches as well as allow for projected future growth at the treatment plants.

The projects will use horizontal directional drilling (HDD) to minimize environmental impacts (in other words, drilling under the sea bed from the shore in order to avoid tearing up the sea bed).

## THE FAMOUS CARBULLIDO LEAK

Under the ground and the fence of Carbullido elementary has been a leak that has grown into a small pond. If you drive by the school you may not even notice the leak as it has been there for so long. Progress comes to Route 8. People who have suffered for more than ten years with low water pressure or even no water in the area of Route 8 will soon have relief. We are hoping anyway, said Jon Quidachay, "Our crews have been working on changing out old sectional valves to control flow of water to the area for the last three months". For the people of Barrigada this has been a long time in coming. According to Mayor Palican, "For years people along Route 8 have been plagued with low water pressure or even no water even in peak hours," he went on to say, "its very difficult to not have water consistently during dinner time or shower time, or to have to take a shower with a bucket." GWA wants to have those folks living along Route 8 to have a standard of living that would reflect 2007.

Mayor Palican said "After Friday's final testing of the system we are hopeful that this will work and the people will have permanent relief," Palican went on to say, "If that works, we will host the crews of GWA with a small thank you barbecue for their heroic and diligent efforts on behalf of the people of Barrigada". Quidachay, said "We hope that today's final testing of the opening of the 12 inch line from the airport will do the trick. It has been activated after three years." "We know its been long overdue", Quidachay added. We know too, and we are keeping our fingers crossed at the GM's office that even though this final testing will be conducted on Friday, July 13th that it will do the trick and resolve the long standing issues.

The 3rd thing I learned is Mr. Kemp is a walking calculator. Formulas and chemical symbols are embedded in his brain. We are lucky to have him!
